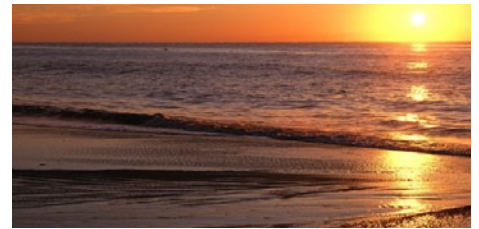

## From the Pastor Transitions

There are periods in our lives when we have a palpable sense of standing on a threshold where our lives are about to change dramatically. Sometimes these thresholds feel heavy and ominous, as after the death of a spouse or a child. Sometimes the threshold is pregnant with hope—literally—when the baby is about to come forth from the womb. Graduation, wedding, job loss, housing change, divorce, death, these are thresholds which evoke the full range of human emotion because we know life will never be the same from this time forth. Things are about to change, and change of any kind is unsettling for most of us because there is so much we cannot know about what lies ahead.

I am one who enjoys change (most changes, most of the time, anyway.) I like to think of life's thresholds as "liminal times." Liminal means "in-between," and carries



with it the feeling of suspended time, of barely perceptible understanding, of both excitement and dis-ease. Each day we have at least two 'liminal' times, the break of dawn and the setting of the sun. Both of these have their own beauty and meaning, but what they have in common is that they are both thresholds of transition.

If you are feeling like you're in a liminal time of life, I invite you to take comfort in these words of Holy Scripture from John's First Letter in the New Testament:

*"Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is."*

The future is securely in God's hands, and so are our lives. Look forward with confidence.

## St. Martin's Youth head to Mississippi

This month, on June 19-27, St. Martin's youth will leave on their Mission Trip to Perkinston, MS to work at siding and roofing homes (and whatever else is needed).

There was no money in St. Martin's budget for this trip so we had to earn the money ourselves. The Youth were asked to pay \$200 each (or what they could afford) toward the cost and they have been working for about six months to raise the remainder, \$16,000. Right now we are close to our goal: \$14,500 has been raised so far and we have one fundraiser left—the pancake and sausage breakfast at Applebees on Saturday, June 5. We still need \$1,500, so we are close.

The Mission Trip group will include 23 Youth, four chaperones (myself, Mike Calvin, Sue Weber, and Julie Weaver). Each chaperone will be assigned about five kids that they will keep track of throughout the trip. All cell phones and iPods of the Youth will be left at home. St. Martin's group will share a bus with St. Maria Goretti Youth and it should take about two days to get there. There will be three churches at the site in Mississippi, about 100 Youth.

The Youth thank the people of St. Martin's for helping them with their fundraisers. I would like to invite the Mission Trip participants, chaperones, their families, and all interested St. Martin's members to the second service, Sunday, June 13 at 9:45. We will be commissioning the Youth and chaperones who are going on the Mission Trip. This will be a special time for the congregation to bless and send us to do God's work in Mississippi. Last year this was a moving experience.

We hope to give feedback from our trip in the next *Crossways*.

## JAM meets Officer Scott

Dear JAM families:  
Last week at JAM Officer Scott from the Cross Plains Police Dept. visited to talk to us about bicycle safety. As you can imagine there were a lot of stories and questions. Did you know:

1. If you ride your bicycle through a stop sign, you can receive a \$88 ticket, no matter how old you are.

2. All bikes need a white reflector on the front and a red reflector on the back. Two of the JAMmers did not have those and need to add them.

3. Bikes should have a bicycle license. You can get one FREE at the Cross Plains Police Dept. It would help you find the bike if it is ever lost or stolen.

4. Bikes should be ridden with a properly fitted helmet; they should fit snug and cover the forehead. New ones should be purchased as your child is growing.

5. Shoes should be worn while riding a bike. Proper shoes are ones with your toes covered.

6. If a child doesn't feel safe riding on a busy road, it is OK to ride on a sidewalk, but should get off the sidewalk or bike if they come to a person walking.

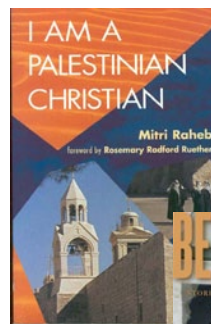
